Killer Cats in Cape Coral

They are the pride and joy of our city -- we're talking about Cape Coral's burrowing owl.

And one wildlife activist is lashing out at cat owners, fearing their pets are roaming known owl burrows and stalking the protected birds.

Dan Tudor with Cape Coral Friends of Wildlife says housecats are stalking the owls. In fact, he says this known owl habitat on the corner of Tudor and Tarpon Drives in the southeast Cape is now abandoned.

"This used to be a very active burrow and the people here loved the owl. Now there's no activity here what so ever. None, it's gone," he tells us.

Cats need to be licensed and vaccinated every year.

And fines for letting them roam free start at \$150 and run up to \$500.

Lee County Animal Services says it will gladly go out to neighborhoods and educate cat owners about what they need to be doing under the law and to preserve the borrowing owl.
