On September 11th, Dr. Jerry Jackson, FGCU professor & wildlife biologist, gave his presentation on the "Burrowing Owls their past, present and future in Florida". Dr. Jackson started with how the species was named and spoke of the first published report of Burrowing Owls in 1782 by Molina in South America. He finished his interesting talk with a question and answer session.

At our October 9th meeting, Nick Bodven, member of the North American Butterfly Association (NABA), enlightened CCFW on butterflies and their migration. Nick explained about the Southwest Florida Monarch Monitoring Program which is used to track their migration patterns. He also informed us about the *Ophryocystis Elektroscirrha*
